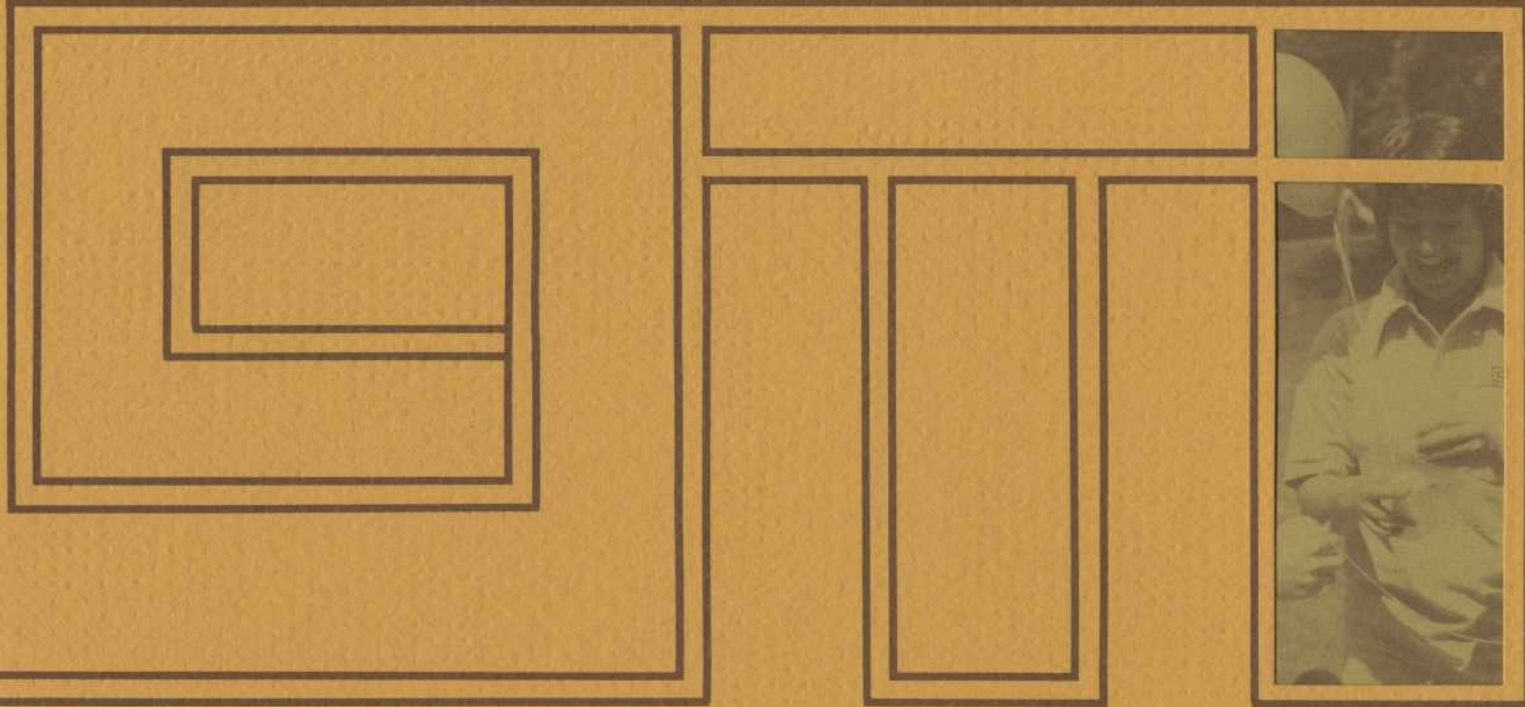


Dear Friend of GTI:

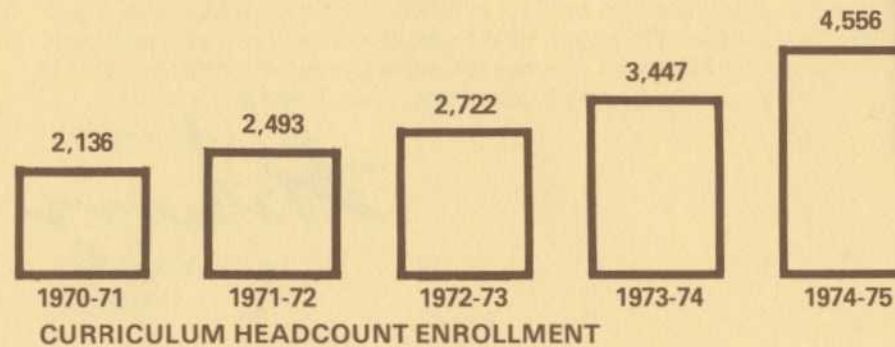


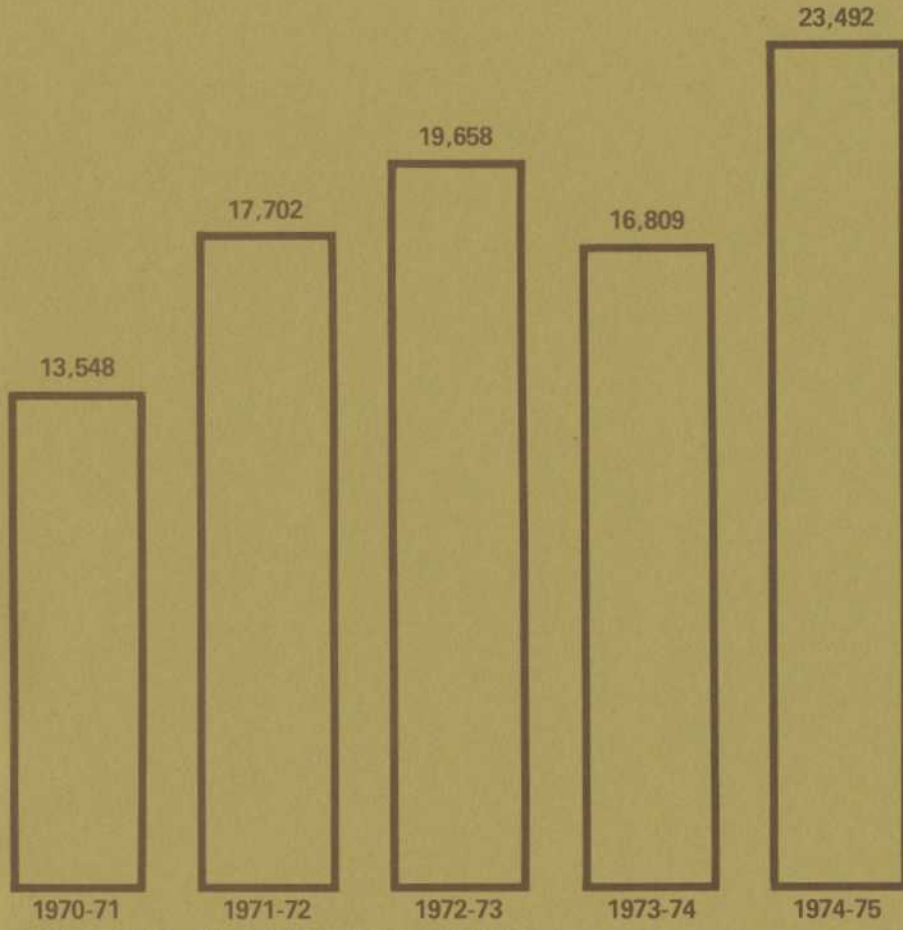
## The Students

Nearly every Guilford County resident 18 years of age or older can be considered a prospective GTI student. Why? Because GTI offers some type of educational program that would interest virtually every adult in this community.

Regular curriculum offerings include 24 two-year technical programs and 12 one-year vocational subjects. Continuing Education offerings number in the hundreds and include everything from basic education to short-term, non-credit personal enrichment classes such as sewing or small engine repair.

GTI students attend classes during both day and evening hours on the main campus at Jamestown or at various teaching centers throughout the county. They represent all age groups, from the 18-year-old preparing for a career to the senior citizen learning macrame. There's a place for everyone at Guilford Technical Institute.

## The Campus

The GTI main campus at Jamestown has truly undergone a "facelift" during the past two years.

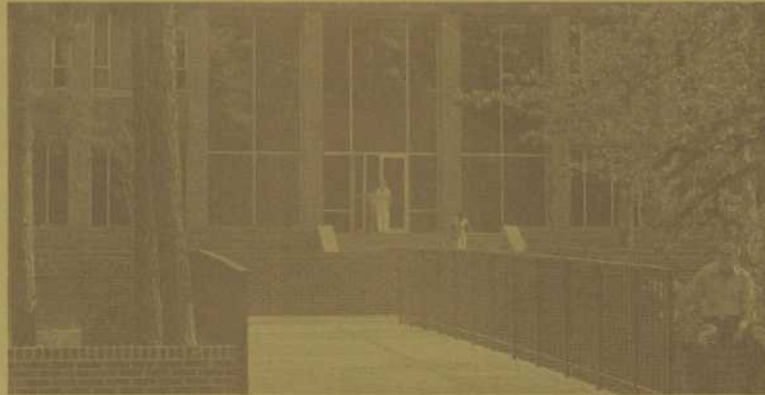
Occupancy of the new Luther R. Medlin Campus Center and the new Learning Resource Center has more than doubled the previous building footage. With the new construction has come a new entrance drive, reconditioned lake-bed, additional parking lots, a new exterior lighting system, and improved water system for fire protection just to mention a few.

Even in view of the completed building and development program described above, construction crews remain on the Jamestown campus working on the most recent project: A Health-Careers Building located where the old Adult Education facility once stood.

This new structure will contain two story levels which will house the GTI Nursing Department and the English-Social Science Department. The cost of the project will be slightly over \$1 million, and its completion date is set for Fall of 1976. The Health-Careers project also involves construction of a parking lot.

Campus construction and improvements have been necessary in order for GTI to serve the continually increasing number of students who register for classes each quarter.

In addition to the Jamestown campus, GTI also maintains satellite campuses in three locations: The Greensboro Division at 501 West Washington Street; the High Point Division in the Arcade Building on Main Street; and Hanger #3 at Regional Airport.

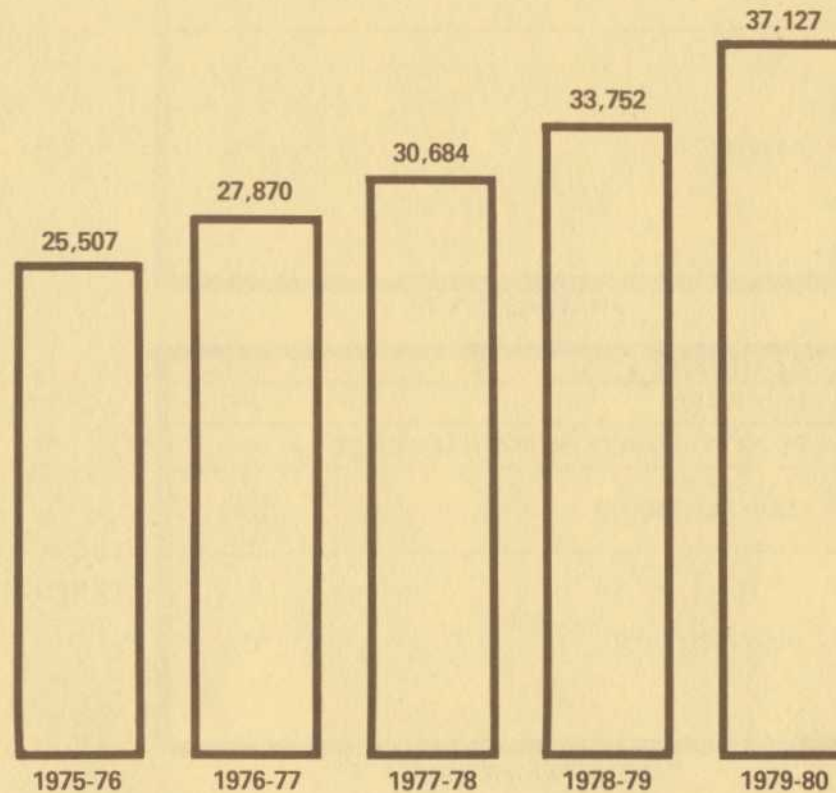
## The Future
